Reva June Nasby, (Page 39/140) formerly of Hobart, Indiana and now residing in Sarasota, Florida, is the youngest of three children of Adelaide Williams and Frank A. Fellows. She received her education in the Gary and Merrillville public schools and Indiana University. Reva June is married to Robert Nasby and they are parents of two daughters, Terry Leigh Nasby Blaschke of Valparaiso, Indiana and Robin Lynn Nasby of Malmo, Sweden.

When Reva June was a young child she showed an interest in family history, which her grandmother, Anna Lila Heyman Williams nurtured. This interest continued, and Reva June participated in writing the 1973 edition of the Heymann History Book. Prior to this Reva June spent hundreds of hours in the Reference Library going through all the phone books from across the United States to obtain the addresses of all the cousins. Then the long process of sending out questionnaires began.

Later with the addition of computers the phone books were eliminated from the Reference Library - but the work continued, to keep her address list updated for the new Heymann History & Genealogy (1560-1997) book. With the need for the new book, much time was spent visiting various court houses for records and data et al, before sending out new questionnaires. Those that replied received a nice write-up in the new book. The job proved to be much more time consuming than before, and the family continued to grow and mushroom. It took five long years to write the book, secure a publisher and get all the orders filled.

Reva June served as President of the John George Heymann Annual August Reunion for many years, and also as Vice President and acting President on the Board of Trustees for the Heymann Historical Society. Much time was spent corresponding with cousins over the years and they gave her family updates and change of addresses. During this time Reva June also wrote and published the annual November newsletter that kept cousins aware of all the improvements the Society was working on, things accomplished each year

The memorial arboretum was established with new light posts and benches. The Friendship Hall was built in time for the 150th anniversary celebration in 1998. First organized on August 14, 1858 as the German Evangelical Reformed Church, the congregation moved into a newly built Hunt's Corners Church building in 1866. In 1982 the remaining members of the congregation transferred the deed to the Heymann Historical Society to allow for preservation of the building. On September 2, 1993 the Hunt's Corners district was added to the National Register of Historic Places by the National Park Service, Department of the Interior, United States of America.



From Our Cousins in Germany

The following letter was sent to William Seaman, Secretary of the Board of Trustees. He provided the translation.

21 September 2001

Dear Cousin William,

A horrible event has affected us all and I cannot express my emotions in English. Please excuse me.

My wife Ellen and I were on vacation at the time at our house in Mecklenburg, when the news of the terrorist attacks in New York, Washington and Pittsburgh reached us. We wanted at first not to believe it and thought it was a horror film. However, our horror was great when we realized it was true. Grief and deep sympathy for the victims was our reaction. We think constantly about the sad event and would like to express our solidarity with all of our Cousins in America.

It is not only an attack upon America, but also upon the entire free world. I am certain that the German solidarity with our American partners stands and that we will win the war against international terrorism.

We all have to reevaluate our lives but remember that 'life must go on.' This challenge I have heard many times in the last few days. To carry on now is a skill, due to the terror of the past week. It's easier said than done. We no longer know what will follow the events of the 11th of September. We can only hope and pray, that no additional terrible events will arise in the coming weeks, and slowly we will return to our daily routine.

Security, humanity, trust, hope, dreams, wishes - all lay under the rubble of the world trade center. Life goes on, but we all have the right to mourn.

Please share my letter at the next board meeting and also, if possible, in the next annual report.

Dear Cousins,

In the participant list of the 4th Europe journey of the Heymann Historical Society we have found your email address. We have therefore the possibility to express our sympathy felt deeply to you and the complete American people now for the terrible crime which has happened in the USA. The results of this terrible assassination cannot be foreseen yet. We hope very much that at the accident no relatives are involved.

In the meantime, we know, that is the extent of the destruction and the number of the human sacrifices much more greatly than assumed, originally. The population shows very great sympathy in Germany. Everywhere in the country gives memorial services in the churches. In Bad Ems we attend a such memorial service this evening, too. There were 5 minute's silences at 10 h. in all businesses and factories today. Busses and trains also stood still. Condolences-- books lie in public administrations, businesses and with newspapers we put down our name also will on this one.

The state television brings reports of the destruction over almost the whole day. One questions also German people at this. The

2001 John George Heymann Family Reunion

The 84th Annual John George Heymann family reunion (Pages 112-188) was held Sunday, August 5, 2001 in the new Friendship Hall where registration began at 9:30 AM.

At 10:30 A.M. Sunday services were held in the Hunt's Corners Church with Cousin Rev. Lloyd Linder of Fremont, Ohio conducting the service, and Cousin Marilyn Richard of McClure, Ohio serving as organist. Approximately 65 Cousins attended.

The noon luncheon was held in the Friendship Hall with approximately 125 present from Indiana, Florida, North Carolina, Texas, New Mexico, Michigan, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania and Ohio. The prizes for "Traveling The Furthest" were awarded to Henk Van Der Merwe from South Africa and Joan Bower from Seoul, Korea.

President Reva June Nasby of Hobart, Indiana opened the business meeting at 12:45 P.M. and the minutes of the 2000 Reunion were read by Norma Zorn of Sandusky, Ohio. The Treasurer's Report showed a \$357.37 deficit, which was absorbed as usual by Reva June and John Seaman past President of the Heymann Historical Society of Monroeville, Ohio.

Following the resignation of Maurice Heymann as Treasurer of the Heymann Historical Society, the Cousins were introduced to the new H.H.S. Treasurer, Kurt Heyman of Huron, Ohio. He read the list of deaths over the past year, which was followed by a moment of silence.

All Cousins stood and introduced themselves and the prizes for the "Youngest Attending" went to Samuel Myers, age 6 1/2 months from Port Matilda, Pennsylvania and Skyler Scheid, age 10 months. Althea Mathews of Lorain, Ohio was again named the "Oldest Attending" at age 92 years and celebrated her 93rd birthday September 24, 2001. She is an inspiration for all of us.

Some of the 72 Cousins that participated in the "Cousins 4th Trip to Europe" in May/June 2001 enjoyed exchanging photos and sharing their photo albums and souvenirs with the other Cousins, after touring the capitals of Europe in London, England, Paris, France, Amsterdam, Netherlands, Luxembourg and of course the ancestral Village of Kaltenholzhhausen and dinner in the Family Castle at Burgschwalbach. Any of the 257 Cousins that had gone on any of the four trips to Europe were asked to stand ... and that made quite a group!

Heymann Cousins 4th Trip To Europe



May 31, 2001 to June 12, 2001

Heyman Cousins from 11 states around the U.S.A. met in Chicago for the 4th trip to Europe. The group numbered 70 people, and it included two families that covered three generations. One of our German Cousins-Ulrike Gapp from Burgschwalbach, joined us in London for the entire trip.

The places we visited were: London and Windsor, England; Paris and Versailles, France; Brussels and Brugge, Belgium; Delft, Amsterdam and Volendam, Holland; Luxembourg; and Trier, Dauborn, Gnadenenthal, Kaltenholzhhausen, Burgschwalbach, St. Goar, and Cologne, Germany. We flew into London and flew home from Frankfurt.

Some of the highlights of the trip were:

- 1) the rehearsal of the parade "Trooping the Colour" in London;
- 2) the beautiful musical fountains and Palace of Versailles;
- 3) the Heymann group photo which was taken in front of the Eiffel Tower in Paris;
- 4) being hosted at the home of Cousin Jurgen Heimann and family in Luxembourg and Rudolf Wagner and family in Dauborn;
- 5) getting to meet and visit with all our hosting German Cousins at the Church service and noon luncheon in Kaltenholzhhausen and the "Rittersaal" dinner in the family castle of Burgschwalbach.

The newsletter also included items about weddings in the Church, reunions of all the various branches of the family each year, the annual financial report, list of board members, condolences, memorials, contributions - and also a popular list of those attending the John George Heymann Reunion, 75 years ago, where Cousins could see when they or members of their family attended those gatherings.

Reva June also organized four different trips to Europe - with 257 Cousins participating—in touring Italy, Switzerland, Austria, France, England, Belgium, Holland, Luxembourg - and of course Germany - where they attended church with our Cousins, and spent time visiting our ancestral Village of Kaltenholzhausen, and also having dinner each time in the Family Castle at Burgschwalbach, where several climbed the Castle Tower to enjoy the view of the beautiful countryside.

The friendship of Cousins on both sides of the Atlantic Ocean continued to grow, and several Cousins made the trip from Germany to Ohio over the years to visit. The largest contingent arrived to help celebrate the 150th Anniversary of the arrival of the John George Heymann family. Reva June also organized their activities for their two week stay as they toured Ohio, Indiana and the Chicago land area - and a good time was had by all.

Now after over 30 years of service Reva June is retired, and she and husband Bob plan to relax and later add to their travels together, and begin just a little slower pace. It was a difficult decision to make, but Bob felt she had earned a rest from all her many endeavors, as it had become a seven day week job. Now the move is complete - and they feel like newlyweds in their brand new Florida home.


