

stay and then proceeded by boat (a Russian cruise ship, of all things, what an experience that was) to Brindisi, Italy. From there we headed north, toured northern Italy, drove through Switzerland, and then back into Germany. By that time, Germany seemed like a long lost home.

My dear father, Edward Ernest Heyman, now deceased since 1987, had encouraged me to visit family while I was in Germany. He had provided me with a mimeographed sheet with the addresses of over 30 relatives in Germany. Ken and I were making our way up the Rhine River when I pulled out the list, checked the map, and noted that one of the addresses was near where we were headed. As I recall, Bad Schwalbach was situated right near the knee of the Rhine River in the Wiesbaden area, and it probably still is. Unannounced, on a pleasant August afternoon, we drove up to the address, knocked on the door, and I introduced myself as (hopefully) a relative from the USA traveling through Germany. An expression of warm delight immediately swept across the face of Heinz Heymann. He stepped aside, invited us in, and he and his entire family proved to be the most gracious hosts I have encountered in all of my travels. He insisted we spend the evening there, and a most delicious dinner was prepared on literally no notice. Excellent bottles of a wonderful wine from the region were produced from the cellar. He explained that the wine from this region (Rheingau) was produced from a particularly sweet grape. The taste was special because the steep banks down to the Rhine River in this area were angled in such a way that the amount of sun for this grape was maximized. A good Rheingau in our country can be a bit expensive, but try it some time, I bet you will like it.

We discussed our travels of that summer, as the family was very interested. Near the end of the dinner, Heinz Heymann produced a very nice gift to me. It was a copy of the family coat of arms, as seen in the 1973 and the 1997 genealogies. Upon my return in 1967, the coat of arms was forwarded to the group led by Ruth Heyman (page 423) that had begun work on the 1973 edition of the Heymann genealogy. As indicated in the 1997 edition, it was through the work of Heinrich Heimann of Welle, Germany, that led to the acceptance by the Her-

aldry Committee of the Heymann/Heimann Family Coat of Arms as No. 6475/70 in the Catalog of German Coats of Arms. Finally, our stay with the family of August and Heinz Heymann was not complete without a mention of the "Heymann" Castle. The family was quick to point out that Heymann family members participated as laborers in the building of the castle, never owning nor residing in the castle. Later in the evening after a little more wine, a story was told of ancient family members exploring the depths of the castle guided by light from burning oil in the bottom of a skull. So, one could say that the family was responsible for developing the first "headlight". Four years later, in 1971, Roland Urban of that same Bad Schwalbach family, traveled to Mt. Clemens, Michigan as part of an au-paire program, and we were very happy to have him as a guest in our home in Ferndale, Michigan.

I am not the only one to say this, but if you travel to Germany, you can count on gracious family hosts and an unforgettable experience. By the way, I still have that motorcycle and I still love to travel. In 2002, I did an eight lecture series on the American Public Schools in China. I checked all of the phone books over there, and there was not a single Heymann, no matter what the spelling. One final note, if you are ever in the Evergreen, Colorado area, please give me a call, the family is always welcome. My Hunt's Corners Church *A Remembrance*

Are you one of the cousins that had the privilege of attending the Hunt's Comer Church? I had that privilege. When I was in the fifth grade [1935] my parents, Oscar and Allean Heyman Gustafson moved to a farm near Monroeville, Ohio. It was my mother's home area and she was happy to take her family to the church she had attended in her youth.

Every Sunday morning we would all get ready and go to church in our Model A Ford. There were usually 30 to 50 attending Sunday School. We shared a minister with another church so the time for the church service varied. We had a great Sunday School teacher named Leil Heyman. She also taught our catechetical class before we were confirmed. The people attending at that time were great. We knew and loved them all. A few that I can mention are the Howard Heyman family, the James Harper family, the Dan Heyman family, the Carson Smith family, the Harold Heyman family, the Donald Farr family and many more.

Every Christmas it seemed that I was a shepherd or a wise man. Each child was given an orange and a little box of hard candy. There were unhappy times too. When I was in high school my mother died very unexpectedly. Her funeral was held there. Oh my. When I was in World War II it was a joy to receive boxes of goodies from my home church. While I was in Europe my sister Janet was married there.

We lived in Raleigh when we received an invitation to the last service. I was sad that we could not go. Now thanks to the Heyman Historical Society we can attend a service each time that we go to the reunion. Each time that we go happy thoughts run through my mind, many loving people fill my memories and we always go to the piano to look at the cross sitting there. It was made by my brother Ray in his high school industrial arts class in 1944. Happy memories to each of you.

Reflections on Hunt's Corners

Serving in Iraq

First Lieutenant, Joseph Heyman (page 171), Tank Platoon Leader, 3rd Armored Cavalry, U.S. Army, and son of HHS Trustee, Matt, and Pamela Heyman, recently returned from a nearly 12-month tour of duty in Iraq.

Joe graduated from Otsego High School in Pontogany, Ohio in 1998. He went on to earn a Bachelor of Science Degree in Electrical Engineering from the United States Military Academy-West Point in 2002. He completed the Officer Basic Course (Armour) at Ft. Knox in Kentucky. Since January 2003 he is has been stationed at Ft. Carson in Colorado. On April 15th of 2003, he was deployed to Kuwait and crossed the border into Iraq on May 1st. He was stationed in Al Anbar Province, west of Baghdad and located in the Ramadi area for a couple of months.

He was promoted to 1st Lieutenant on December 1, 2003. In his position as tank platoon leader, he is responsible for 5 tanks and 18 personnel. He describes his duties as providing security, reconnaissance and escort patrols. An example of an escort patrol is accompanying personnel during a currency exchange. He also escorted civilian contractors rebuilding schools, and Iraqi Civil Defense Corps recruits. He returned to Ft. Carson, Colorado in March, 2004 and subsequently visited Ohio, on leave.

Editor's note: The following story was sent in by Ernie Heyman, page 549. It is a descriptive, tongue-in-cheek account of a 1967 trip through Europe and describes the benefits of traveling overseas, experiencing other cultures, and most importantly, renewing family ties.

Visiting Europe and Family in 1967

In 1967, I was in my early twenties and filled with a wanderlust not uncommon to folks of that age. I really wanted to see Europe and to tour by motorcycle. I had just finished my first year of teaching English and Social Studies in a junior high in Westland, Michigan. I was able to talk a fellow first year teacher, Ken Duma (now a lifelong friend), into joining me on this summer long venture. Neither of us had traveled abroad. He had never ridden a motorcycle; I was a seasoned veteran of two years experience. He took a two mile test drive on my R26 BMW and pronounced himself ready to go. I had been shown how to adjust the valves and clutch, so I was appointed head mechanic. I remember thinking if we just do not have any electrical problems, I think we will be OK. Naturally, we had nothing but one electrical problem after another on the trip. That is not a highly recommended way to learn about new things, especially when much of our travel was in countries without BMW stores. In such a situation, one learns to be resourceful. I may be digressing a bit here, but please be patient, the story does have a Heymann genealogical connection. Simply put, I would like to encourage people in the family, particularly the young people, to travel abroad. Not just to connect with genealogical roots, but to experience different cultures as well. Extended trips, those of two months or more, change you in an almost inexplicable way. Your perspective is broadened; you become less judgmental by experiencing other cultures. I did this several times in my twenties and when I returned I felt my ability to determine the shinola was definitely enhanced.

Ken and I embarked from Detroit on a Pan Am jet and arrived in London in mid-June of 1967, and we returned at the end of August. As I recall, the whole trip including flight, purchase of motorcycles, and all other expenses came to just about \$2000. I do not think one could replicate that today. We were basically on a \$10 per day budget. We stayed mainly in *pensions*, and that usually included a breakfast. We seemed to eat well, although cheaply, and we drank a lot of beer. It is hard even now for me to believe the prodigious quantities of beer we consumed on some evenings.

After touring London for a few days, we went by ferry and train to Munich, Germany. There we purchased two 1961 R27 BMW motorcycles for about \$300 dollars each. After seeing the sights of Munchen for a few days, including some wonderful beer halls, we set off for Austria and points SE. One of Ken's conditions for accompanying me on this trip was to include a visit to his relatives in Romania. So, soon we were traveling through Yugoslavia, Bulgaria, and finally arriving in Romania. This was the first year of free travel (without a special Washington issued visa) through these then-communist countries. One of the most lasting impressions I have of these countries is the drabness of the small stores. There was very little product selection and, of course, no money was put into advertising, packaging, or competing products. It was also quite an experience to arrive at his aunt's house with the dirt floors, no refrigeration, and no modern plumbing (an out-house). Well, after a few days, we continued on to Turkey for a terrific

First organized on August 14, 1858 as the German Evangelical Reformed Church, the congregation moved into a newly built Hunt's Corners Church building in 1866. In 1982 the remaining members of the congregation transferred the deed to the Heymann Historical Society to allow for preservation of the building. On September 2, 1993 the Hunt's Corners district was added to the National Register of Historic Places by the National Park Service, United States Department of the Interior.

Memorial Brick Orders Due June 7th

The memorial brick sidewalk is an ongoing project, but if you want to get in on the initial installation, which will be ready for the 87th Annual John George Heymann reunion August 1, 2004, your order must be received by June 7th, 2004. You can order a memorial brick at any time, but we have not yet scheduled additional installation dates.

Memorial Brick Sidewalk

The Heymann Historical Society, formed in December 1981, will celebrate the 25th anniversary in 2006. In preparation the Trustees plan to upgrade the Church property by installing a brick sidewalk beginning in the spring of 2004. The deteriorating steps will be replaced, and a new handrail and landscaping installed.

HHS members can purchase a memorial brick for the sidewalk. The red bricks are 4 by 8 inches and will be engraved with uppercase block letters. Each brick will have two lines of text with a maximum of 14 spaces per line, available for engraving. Each space will count as 1 character of the 14 total characters possible per line. The cost to purchase each brick, including the engraving, is \$50. The proceeds from the sale of the memorial bricks will be used to support ongoing maintenance of the Church.
