One of the most anticipated German Christmas traditions is the Christmas dinner! The traditional Christmas meal features duck, goose, rabbit, or a roast. This main dish is accompanied by German delicacies such as apple and sausage stuffing, red cabbage and potato dumplings. Dessert typically includes Christmas Stollen, considered one of the best Christmas pastries in the world! The most famous Stollen, which can be found at many supermarkets, is called Dresdner Stollen. This tasty version bursts with nuts and fruit and is sure to change your mind about the term "fruitcake." Stollen is shaped with tapered ends and a ridge down the center, symbolizing the Baby Jesus in swaddling clothes. (From germanfoods.org)

Minutes from Fall Board Meeting

The Fall Meeting of the Heymann Historical Society was held on September 20, 2018 in Hunts Corners Ohio. The meeting was called to order at 2:03 PM. Board members present were David Hyman, William Seaman, Kurt Heyman, Marcia Adelman, Scott Bailey, Neil Horn, Beth Horvatch, Lanton Lee, Rachel Parrett and Ed Rose. Ulrike Gapp was not present. Minutes of the spring meeting [held on April 8, 2018 in Paulding, Ohio] were read by William Seaman. Two corrections were noted. Marcia Adelman's first name is spelled 'Marcia', not 'Marsha'. The second correction was under new business. Ed Rose suggested the contest to award a 23&me genetic test, not Rachel Parrett. Lanton Lee moved to accept the minutes with the stated corrections, Beth Horvatch seconded the motion and said motion passed without dissent.

Kurt Heyman then gave the treasurer's report. As is the standard practice, Kurt went over the income statement first, comparing the prior year to the current year. Kurt then discussed the Society's balance sheet, asset balances and inventory balances. Kurt also attached a record of cash contributions received by the Society from January 1, 2018 to September 30, 2018. Beth Horvatch made the motion to accept the treasurer's report, and the motion was seconded by Neil Horn. The motion passed unanimously. Kurt Heyman read a note penned to the board by Ulrike Gapp, discussing the ongoing, and not very fast, renovation of the Burgschwalbach castle. The note and pictures of the ongoing renovation were examined by all members present.

In Old Business, Rachel Parrett gave the report on the Society website and the newsletter. Rachel reported that more people are downloading from the website, but we need to drive more traffic there. As usual, she pleads with the board and all the cousins for interesting stories for the newsletter. Jackie Hyman gave the report on the sale of bricks and gift items. Sales at the most recent family reunion in August were minimal, at best. There was talk of raffling off some of the family history book at the next reunion, but no official motion was offered or voted upon. Jackie also updated us on the 2020 trip to Europe. There is no new information to be shared at this time. If I can decipher my scribble accurately – 29 family members and 9 non-family members are signed up for the trip. Rachel has been contacted by Bowling Green State University, Firelands – to participate in 2019/2020 programming regarding genealogy – specifically how the Heymann Historical Society has managed its affairs

over the last 35 years or so. More details are to follow. We did not, at the time of the meeting, have an update on the health status of our former Vice President, Duane Heyman. At the next annual meeting in August 2019, we will be able to fill that vacancy. One of the banners has been installed in the church – thanks to the Parrett family. The remaining two banners are still being worked on, and will be installed prior to the August 2019 family reunion. The Parrett family also did some touch up painting on the interior of the church. We are still short one member of the board, due to Duane Heyman's resignation. Some names were discussed during the meeting, and the membership committee was encouraged to reach out to several people who we thought would be good candidates. The spring meeting will tentatively be held March 31, 2019 at the home of David and Jackie Hyman. Pat Hyman, from the William Conrad branch of the family, was the first winner of the 23&me contest for discovering the name of the ship that brought their forefather to the United States. The name of the ship was the Yorktown. A motion was offered by Rachel Parrett to authorize \$100 to cover the cost of the genetic test for the winner, Pat Hyman. Neil Horn seconded the motion and it passed without dissent. At 2:56 Marcia Adelman moved to adjourn the meeting. Beth Horvatch quickly seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

Burgschwalbach Restorations Ongoing



A short distance from our ancestral home of Kaltenholzhausen, Germany is a beautiful structure known as the Castle at Burgschwalbach. Our family has a very close connection to this historic building and on several occasions, the American branch of the family has had the opportunity to enjoy a medieval dinner within its walls followed by a climb up the steep stone steps to the castle tower for a panoramic view of the surrounding countryside, just as our German relatives might have done centuries ago. Before you start asking what happened to the family's crown jewels, you might find it important to know that the Castle at Burgschwalbach was built *by* Heymanns, not *for* them! Construction of the castle began in 1338 and was completed in 1371 by count Eberhard V of Katzenelnbogen. This beautiful 14th century castle has been undergoing restoration work for years... and years. Travelers were unable to visit the castle on the 2014 Cousins Trip to Europe, and many have been hoping for better luck in 2020. Board member and cousin Ulrike Gapp, who resides in Burgschwalbach, informed the Board recently that restoration work will be ongoing throughout 2020, so it is extremely unlikely that the next group of American cousins will be able to get much more than some snapshots of the exterior.

However, recently, Ulrike was fortunate enough to be part of a select group that was given a behind-the-scenes tour of the castle grounds to learn more about the improvements being made there. The pictures on this page were taken by her and show the extensive measures being taken to secure the castle and to preserve it for future generations to enjoy. Of particular interest to the local crews working on this project have been the historic artifacts they have uncovered on the castle grounds. Various pieces of pottery, tools, and decorative items have been found so far and were on display for Ulrike's group to examine. While we are impatient to visit this beautiful castle that was built by Heymann hands, we are very thankful that it is being so carefully restored.



Genealogy Sleuth Contest

The first winner of our genealogy research contest is Robert Pat Hyman who traced his great grandfather Fredrick Heiman's arrival in New York in April of 1852 aboard the ship the Yorktown. Fredrick William Heiman was three years old at the time and was traveling to the United States with his mother, Mary Heiman, the wife of William Conrad Heiman. For those of you who have ancestry.com accounts, you can verify this information and get a glimpse of the ship's manifest with the names of the Heiman family.

Pat will receive a gift certificate to 23andMe for a DNA genetic report.

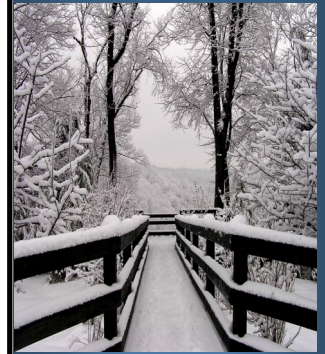
