From Kaltenholzhausen to Hunt's Corners to... Harper Woods, Michigan... Get to Know Your Board Secretary

Editor's Note: This edition of the newsletter features a short bio of our much-loved Board Secretary William "Bill" Seaman. William is the son of longtime Board President John Seaman. I'm sure you'll enjoy his short summary of his background as well as several familial anecdotes. William is pictured below giving a tractor ride to our son at the annual reunion in August.



High School – Western Reserve Academy – also my father's alma mater – and despite rumors to the contrary it was not because of any brush with the law. It was a boarding school, not a reform school. Although going to school every Saturday for half the day did feel like punishment. College – Kenyon – a little school in Gambier, Ohio surrounded by farms. Felt like home. Post Graduate – MBA from Wayne State University – a large school smack dab in Detroit, not surrounded by farms. Classmates from the Ukraine, Pakistan, India, the People's Republic of China, Japan and the occasional American. Also felt like home. Employment – Have worked for the Federal Government (Social Security Administration) for 34 years. Have been in management for 28 ½ years and work in Pontiac, Michigan at the moment. It's hard to describe what I do, other than assuring you that I treat your tax money as if it were my own. On second thought, perhaps that wording would worry someone, but you know what I mean. Life since leaving Kenyon – Besides working for the Federal

Government in two states (IN and MI) I coached boys and girls lacrosse for 18 seasons. My wife used to say that she could find the field just by listening for my voice. That probably meant we were losing.

Family – Survived my youth despite having 4 sisters and 2 brothers who were always trying to, let's speak bluntly here, injure or kill me. From being pushed out of the tree (12 stitches – I had not yet learned how to tuck and roll), bucked off a pony, bounced off hay wagons (thank you Philip) and generally falling off ladders everywhere (weren't you supposed to be holding that ladder?) – it was hazardous duty every day. It's a miracle I didn't fall down the well. I also almost ran myself over this fall, when I failed to put my vehicle in park while tending to a fire, and the car passed me on the right on the way down the hill.

Married to Donna – who is an absolute saint. Everyone who knows her, and me, understands and agrees with this statement completely and wholeheartedly. Have five children – Shaun and Amanda (via Donna) and Gillian, MacKenzie and Sean (via my first marriage). It's Brady Bunch like, but it works. Shaun gets to have a brother, and Amanda gets to have sisters. Win, win.

Farm life – We all know big brother Philip is the farmer, and has been since he's been 6 years old. It was a bit of an omen when he started the Oliver combine at that age and drove it into the side of the barn. In our family we call that precocious. In 2014 that gets you front page space in the local newspaper. Donna and I are in Ohio nearly every weekend. She is the gardener, pool expert and foreman. I would describe my duties as the janitor, landscaper, roofer, garbage man, tree trimmer, etc. It's hard to describe how glamorous my life is, so I won't.

Tenure on the Heymann Historical Society – I have been there since the beginning. It's one of my longest relationships. Some funny stories - We are from Germany, at least that's what the book says. During one reunion we actually served beer. In my barn, across the road from the church. You would have thought a revolution was going on - because it was a politically sensitive issue. I do remember the tables being quite full. Folks were probably just watching other people drink, but if you want to improve family reunion attendance, that might be an option... Before I bought that parcel from my father in 1983 - there was a run in with a tractor, the bucket on the tractor and the barn door. The barn door lost, the tractor won and John Seaman (Daddy) used some choice words to describe my carelessness. He was right on every count. Sometimes you deserve the criticism and just have to soak it in. I've cleaned up the language here for the faint of heart. In those five minutes he could have been a bond trader employed on Wall Street. If you are related to my father, you always have stories about weddings to share. My personal favorite (out of five) was the 3rd wedding to Ann Roderick at Hunt's Corners. It was officiated, if my recall is correct, by a former priest, who proceeded to conduct a Sioux marriage ceremony. All the grandchildren were in the front row of the church and it was actually quite charming. Later in the day my father consumed some warm shrimp, and we thought he might not make it through the night. But he did. He also stated at that wedding that this was his 'last' wedding. We all know how that worked out. A couple of years ago my then 4 year old grandchild saw a 'man with a pan' very late at night in the second floor of the Bed and Breakfast. It was late, so my son Shaun told her not to alarm her mother and they went to bed. We think Lyla received a visit from LP that night, because he recognized something of a kindred spirit in Lyla. We showed Lyla his picture the next day and she said "That's him!" We can also tell you about the time my former brother-in-law was tapped on the shoulder to go to bed by a ghost or the time the ghost pushed the same brother-in-law off the porch of the Bed and Breakfast, but that would be piling on...

Despite the beer, cussing, breaking stuff, and the ghosts – at least we know where we come from. I wouldn't trade the houses, barns or land at Hunt's Corners for anything.

Dear Cousins,

At the Spring meeting of the Board of the Heymann-Heimann Historical Society, held at the home of Board Member Matt Heyman, a number of issues received attention. The Board decided to remove part of the white fence around the church, and that was accomplished on April 6th. On that same date the Society took possession of a very nice organ which was located by Marcia Adelman and donated to the Society by Mr. and Mrs. Gene Muehling. The new organ has been installed in the church and replaces an old, non-functional organ. Last year there were three weddings which took place at the church and a functioning organ is useful for that purpose as well as the Sunday church service which precedes each annual meeting in August. The rewiring of the church will take place in the near future and then the repainting of the church's interior and replacement of the old carpeting will follow.

The Cousins' trip to Europe, and especially to our original "Home Town" of Kaltenholzhausen, Germany, will take place as scheduled in August. Minutes from the Spring 2014 Meeting


The Heymann Historical Society Spring Meeting was held on March 30, 2014 in Grand Rapids, Ohio at the home of Matt Heyman. Roll was called at 1:33 PM. Board members present: David Hyman, William Seaman, Kurt Heyman, Scott Bailey, Neil Horn, Lou Zorn, Rachel Parrett, Chase Heyman, and Matt Heyman. Board members not present: Duane Heyman, Beth Horvatich and Ulrike Gapp. Minutes of the September 29, 2013 meeting were read by William Seaman. No corrections or additions were added. Kurt Heyman made a motion to accept the minutes, Chase Heyman seconded the motion and said motion passed unanimously. Kurt Heyman then presented the treasurer's report. Kurt went over the income statement, balance sheet, asset balances and inventory balances in his usual meticulous manner. The net income for the latest accounting period for the Heymann Historical Society was \$1,927.17. Neil Horn moved to accept the treasurer's report, and David Hyman seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously. Kurt Heyman also submitted the audit committee's report to the board. On February 3, 2014 the audit committee (Chase Heyman, David Hyman, Kurt Heyman) met at Albert Horn's home and reviewed the society's financial records. It was the opinion of the audit committee that the society's records are complete on all accounts. Kurt Heyman moved to accept the audit committee's report, Neil Horn seconded the motion, and the motion passed unanimously.

Old Business- *Church redecoration committee- We are waiting for the rewiring of the interior of the church to be finished prior to the generous offer of Rachel Parrett and spouse to begin the painting of the interior. The expected beginning of the rewiring is late May 2014. Once the new wiring and the painting has been finished Rachel and William will pick out the appropriate carpeting for the church. Cost estimates of the carpet/installation will be shared with the board for approval prior to any purchase decision. *Society website and newsletter- Trip information is being updated on the newsletter. Rachel requests interesting bio information, timely rendering of the notes of the spring meeting, and interesting family history information. *Sales of bricks and gift items-There were 3 within the last fiscal year - including one for Elden Plue. Jackie continues to clean out the inventory, and will push the remaining inventory on the newsletter and at the August 2014 reunion. No new lines or products will be added at this time to our inventory. *August 2014 Family European Trip- Deadline for signing up for the trip is May 1, 2014. The estimated cost at this time is \$5,000 to \$5,200 per person. Almost everything is covered by that cost. Ulrike Gapp will be joining the group in Florence. *Discussions with Firelands Historical Museum to house Heymann family artifacts- Kurt will attempt to meet with the curator of the museum to see if any of our artifacts can find a home there. *Status of partial fence dismantling at the church- April 6, 2014 was set as the date for this project. This project was completed - on that Sunday 220 feet of fence was removed from the north, east and west sides of the church. Scott Bailey, Jackie Hyman, David Hyman, Kurt Heyman, Kyle Heyman, William Seaman and Donna Seaman completed that project. The fence posts and fencing removed were stacked neatly in the Friendship Hall. Chase Heyman joined us for lunch during a nice sunny day at Hunt's Corners.

New Business- Elden Plue thanked the board for the nice words regarding his service for the Society. Glenn Kuebler has offered his expertise in genealogical chart making to the Society. Scott Bailey and Neil Horn believe we need a dynamic family history, something on the order of Wikipedia, where changes and additions and corrections can be made quickly and easily – something not readily available to our earlier authors. It was also the general consensus that we should ask Reva June Nasby for permission to quote from the latest family history book, or ask her to donate her copyright. At 2:56 PM the meeting was adjourned.

Kaltenholzhausen Church Featured in German Newspaper



Evangelische Kirche Kaltenholzhausen steht unter Denkmalschutz

■ Kaltenholzhausen. Schon im 15. Jahrhundert hatte Kaltenholzhausen eine Kirche und war eine Filiale der Pfarrei Hahnstätten. Die heutige Kirche wurde 1895 an der Stelle einer Kapelle aus dem 14. Jahrhundert errichtet. Das Gotteshaus ist ein weithin sichtbares Wahrzeichen der Gemeinde und steht seit 1996 unter Denkmalschutz. 1955 wurde Kaltenholzhauseen in der Kirchspiel Heringen eingegliedert. Recently, the church in Kaltenholzhausen, Germany was featured in a newspaper article remarking on historic buildings. German cousins Rudi and Annelore Altenhofen (who were married in that church on April 16, 1949) sent the accompanying picture of the interior of the church sanctuary with a translation of the caption. It reads as follows:

The Protestant church of Kaltenholzhausen listed as a part of the protection of historical buildings and monuments. Even in the 15th century the village of Kaltenholzhausen already had a church, being affiliated with the parish of Hahnstätten. Today's church was erected in 1895 in place of a chapel from the 14th century. The church can be seen from far away as a famous landmark of the community, being listed as a part of the protection of historic buildings and monuments since 1996. In 1955 Kaltenholzhausen became part of the parish of Heringen.
