Hello Cousins,

I know that it seems early, but 2020 will be here more quickly than you think. We are starting our plans for our next trip to Europe. At this time, in addition to Oberammergau, the following top our list of possible places to enjoy: Neuschwanstein, Hohenschwangau, Dachau, Linderhof, the Eagle's Nest, Nuremberg, the Black Forest, Salzburg, Heidelberg, and Rothenburg. The two weeks will end with a visit to the home of our ancestors in Kaltenholzhausen and Burgschwalbach with a tour of the church and castle (if the remodeling is finished). Karl will determine the best sites, activities, and restaurants for the cousins. As those of you who have travelled with us in the past know, whatever Karl plans for us will make this excursion a most memorable vacation. The trip will most likely be scheduled for early August. We currently have twenty-nine paid deposits (\$500.00) for the forty seats available. I am expecting the cost to be more than \$5,000.00 per person and less than \$6,000.00, but it will be some time before I know the total cost per person as the flight cost will not be available until one year from our return. I have not yet set up a suggested payment schedule for those who prefer to make regular payments and want to avoid the burden of a huge final payment. I will do this in the near future for those who wish to budget monthly for the trip. I am accepting initial and additional deposits from those who choose to send them. Updated Heymann Genealogy Book Available in August

BOOK

Those of you who are familiar with the Heymann Historical Society will certainly acknowledge the impressive and unique qualities of this familial organization. Formally organized in 1981, this Not-For-Profit group seeks to promote our family's heritage in numerous ways. Some of the most valuable resources we have are the books which have been produced throughout the years which chronicle the history of the Heymann and Heimann families across continents for centuries. The compilation of this vast amount of genealogical and historical data has been the work of numerous dedicated family members.

For the last several years, the HHS Board has been searching for a willing genealogist to create an updated supplement to the "Big Blue Book" written by Reva June Nasby which provided information on the branches of the family through 1997. Now, twenty years after the last Heymann volume, Ed Rose, Jr., HHS Board Member and dedicated genealogist, has compiled and published **Supplement A of the Heymann History and Genealogy 1997-2017**. The hardbound, 135 page book provides more recent family history as well as corrections and additions to the 1997 book. The HHS has made 200 copies available for purchase. The society and the entire Heymann family is grateful to Ed for the time, effort, and professional skill he has dedicated to this worthy project. We also thank each family member who submitted biographical data for inclusion in the update.

Supplement A will be unveiled and available for purchase at the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the John George Heymann family reunion on Sunday, August 6th at the pavilion at Hunts Corners. The cost of the book is \$30, and copies of the previous book will also be available for purchase at the reunion for those family members wishing to own the set. These resources are invaluable to those of us who are interested in learning about and preserving our family's history and make meaningful gifts and family heirlooms for generations. For those family members who cannot attend the reunion in August, the remainder of the books will be available for purchase after the reunion by contacting Jackie Hyman (Info available on page 8) beginning in September, 2017.

Among the many treasured documents of the Heymann Historical Society are records of family gatherings spanning generations. What follows here is a transcription of the Minutes from the 50th Anniversary Celebration of the Heyman Family in 1898.

The Heyman family history and reunion reports. The first Heyman family reunion was held Sept. 8, 1898 at the home of John P. Heyman celebrating the 50th anniversary of the settling of the Heyman family at Hunts Corners, Huron County, Ohio. The majority of the Heymans at this time were living in the Buckeye state where the first of the family in America settled. Phillip W. was the "Columbus" of the Heyman family as he came to America ahead of his parent and discovered Hunts Corners. John G. and Mary Heyman coming to America from Nassau, Germany in 1848. They remained in New York State a short time and then came by boat from Buffalo to Sandusky and located at Hunts Corners. It was then a great wilderness. With the Father's and Mother's thrift and vigilance, with the son's help, they cleared acres of land and soon had their farm improved and erected buildings as necessity demanded. The parents lived to see that entire section transformed into prosperous farms. John G. and Mary Heyman were the parents of 10 children six of whom were living and in attendance at this 50th anniversary celebration. They were Phillip W. of Wood County, Henry of Kansas, George W., John P. and William F. of Hunts Corners and Mrs. Chas. Mohr of Haskins, Ohio. There were 178 descendants of John G. and Mary Heyman living in America and 21 in Germany at this time. John G. Heyman was born Sept 1, 1795, died Sept 9, 1881. Mary M. Heyman was born April 14, 1796, died March 29, 1872. And after 19 years had elapsed and only one of the second generation living which was Jeanette Heyman, wife of John P. Heyman. The idea arouse in the minds of some of the younger generation, why not have another Heyman reunion. It was now only talked about but arranged for to be held at the home of W. A. Heyman, Helena, Ohio on Sat., Sept 22, 1917. Jeanette Heyman was appointed our honorary President. She appointing here W. A. to act in her place.

Minutes from Spring Board Meeting

The Spring Meeting of the Heymann Historical Society was held on March 26, 2017 in Grand Rapids, Ohio. The meeting was called to order at 1:21 PM. Board members present were David Hyman, Duane Heyman, William Seaman, Kurt Heyman, Matt Heyman, Neil Horn, Beth Horvatch, Rachel Parrett and Ed Rose. Scott Bailey, Ulrike Gapp and Lou Zorn were not present. Minutes of the September 25, 2016 fall meeting were read by the secretary William Seaman. Neil Horn made the motion to accept the minutes as read, and Duane Heyman seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Kurt Heyman presented the treasurer's report. The first segment of Kurt's presentation covered audits conducted on the 2014, 2015 and 2016 fiscal years for the society by Albert Horn Jr. Kurt and David met with Al the day before the spring meeting to have the audits performed. The good news is that both Al and the society's record keeping are in excellent shape. Kurt discussed the income statement, balance sheet, asset balances, and inventory balances in full detail. Donations were substantially up due to proceeds from Reverend Lloyd Linder's estate. The long misplaced Jacob Heyman safe was discovered by Kurt under a tarp in the south end of David Seaman's and William Seaman's barn at 3036 Sandhill Road. The ferocious canine which occupied this barn residence passed away, enabling a more thorough search and the discovery (without being bitten by a large, crazy dog) of the safe. Neil Horn moved to accept the treasurer's report, and Duane Heyman seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent. Subsequent to the recent discovery of the Jacob Heyman safe a motion was made by Neil Horn to contact the former owner, and to have that owner retrieve the safe before the 2017 fall meeting, and to forfeit any claim of ownership of the safe if not retrieved by that time. The motion was seconded by Duane Heyman and the motion passed unanimously.

Old Business: the Society internet website and newsletter segment was presented by Rachel Parrett. Rachel is always looking for additional stories that would be of interest to our relatives, and is also looking for a quick turnaround on the meeting notes, etc. Rachel will promote the August 2017 family reunion, allegedly the 100th anniversary of this branch of the Heymann family. Rachel also noted that our website is not getting any views from our relatives. Some plan will have to be formulated to drive more traffic to the website.

Update on the supplement to the Heymann/Heimann Genealogy: This segment was presented by Ed Rose. Ed has done great work in updating the genealogy. The supplement is approximately 150 pages and contains approximately 1450 names. Ed presented the options for binding the new supplement, some options were more durable than others. After voting 6 to 3 in favor of a hardbound book option for the supplement, Ed was authorized by a unanimously passed motion to check with the printer in Worthington, Ohio to see if a hardbound edition could also be an option from them. Ed expects the turnaround time for the supplement printing to be two to three weeks. After some discussion, William Seaman moved to price the new supplement at \$30 at the reunion in August 2017, and \$30 plus shipping and handling if the new supplement must be mailed to the purchaser. Neil Horn seconded the motion and it passed without dissent. For comparison purposes, the big blue family history book is priced at \$50. Duane Heyman then moved to authorize Ed Rose to print/purchase 200 copies of the new supplement. Neil Horn seconded the motion it also passed without dissent. Jackie Hyman will look into the cost of clear plastic covers for the new supplement hard bound books, as a possible accessory.

Gifts received by the society: A list of donors for 2016 was distributed by Kurt, and as stated earlier the estate of Lloyd Linder was the largest donation to the society in 2016. Sale of bricks and gift items: Kurt reported very minimal sales of bricks – 1 to 2. Jackie Hyman stated she had sold multiple genealogy books since our last meeting. Jackie has cookbooks still available as well. 2020 Cousins trip to Europe: Jackie Hyman updated the board on this issue. Jackie has had recent contact with Karl – our tour guide. At the time of the meeting, 26 people have signed up for the trip. We can accept additional individuals for the trip. After some discussion, our preferred time to travel there would be the first half of August 2020. The group will spend two nights in the vicinity of Oberammergau in order to see the Passion Play. The cost of the trip will include tickets to the Passion Play. We are confident that Karl will have an excellent itinerary for the group. Final full payment of the cost of the trip, which is unknown at this time, would be due 90 days before the trip departure, so sometime near the end of April 2020.

Door Replacement: The exterior doors of the church are old, warped and in need of replacement. Matt Heyman submitted an estimate to replace those two exterior doors. It was the consensus that steel doors would be the best option – since the doors face south and would better resist warping than wood doors. With labor and materials, the approximate cost would be between \$1600 and \$1700. Kurt Heyman made the motion to have the steel doors ordered and installed. Neil Horn seconded the motion and it passed without dissent. Matt hopes to have the doors installed by the end of April 2017.

New Business - Painting of the church: The church was last painted in 2009. Matt Heyman will contact the painter who last worked on the church to get an estimate for repainting the whole structure. 2017 100-year anniversary of reunion - Kurt suggested we offer support to Catharine Downing so that we have a successful and well attended reunion. At 3:19 PM Duane Heyman moved to adjourn the meeting. Beth Horvatch seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

The Heyman Family Reunion in 1917

The following is a transcription of the Minutes of the 1917 Heyman family reunion which took place in Helena, Ohio.

The second Heyman family reunion was held on Saturday, Sept. 22, 1917 at the beautiful home of W. A. Heyman, Helena, Sandusky County, Ohio. There were about 150 present, following a very sumptuous dinner such as the Heyman's were noted for, was a short programme. History of the Heyman family was read by Mrs. Louisa E. Ross, Weston, Ohio. The report of the 50th anniversary of the settlement of the Heyman family at Hunts Corners was read by Dan Heyman Jr. following was a song by John Jr. and Robert McKee, "We are little Soldiers." Also a recitation by Gladys Heyman. The following officers were elected for the following year, President, W. A. Heyman, Secretary and Treasurer-Mrs. Flora M. McKee, Weston, Ohio, Cor. Secretary Mrs. Louisa E. Ross, Weston, Ohio. Executive committee was appointed by Pres. and Sec. namely Mrs. Louisa E. Ross, Weston, Ohio, Phillip Ziss, Haskins, Ohio, Mrs. Lydia Dauer, Haskins, O(hio), Dan Heyman, Monroeville, Ohio, Louis P Heyman Bellevue, O(hio), Mrs. Paulina Shutzberg, Haskins, Ohio, Oliver Heyman, Bellevue, Ohio.

A motion was carried to hold the next reunion on Saturday, Aug. 24-1918 at Fremont Fair grounds, Fremont, Ohio. A collection was taken which amounted to \$11.40. A picture of the family group was taken and 25 pictures were sold.

A vote of thanks was tendered Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Heyman for their royal hospitality. After singing "God be with you till we meet again", all adjourned feeling glad that this reunion had been revived. Expenses for the year were as follows: Secretary book - \$1.50, Family record book - \$.60, Renting of chairs and dishes - \$2.50, Printing and mailing of 1918 reunion - \$3.25, Total - \$7.95. Amount of collection - \$11.40. Balance - \$3.45 -Flora McKee, Secretary

In the News 100 Years Ago...



PRIVATE:
STEPHEN C. HEYMAN

NORWALK, OHIO.

Born in Lyme Twp., January 4, 1890. Single. Son of David and Minnie Heyman. Entered service October 6, 1917. 101st Infantry. Active Overseas service. Killed in action October 4, 1918, in Argonne Drive.

In 1917 the Great War was waging in Europe. In January of that year, the British intercepted the notorious Zimmermann Telegram. At the end of the same month, Germany announced the initiation of their policy of unrestricted submarine warfare. The United States adopted a policy of "Armed Neutrality," and on April 6th, the US issued a formal declaration of war against Germany.

Among the first wave of men to enter into service for our country was Norwalk, Ohio native Stephen C. Heyman, pictured at left. Heyman was one of the first residents of Huron County to enter into combat on behalf of the United States. Many others followed, including several more Heymans of Huron County who served overseas beginning in 1918. Nearly one year from the date he entered into service, Stephen C. Heyman was killed in action on October 4, 1918 in the Argonne Drive.

Other Interesting Happenings in 1917

- 73 die when the Silvertown munitions factory in Essex, England explodes.
- The Red Sox sell Smokey Joe Wood, his arm dead at 26, to the Cleveland Indians for \$15,000
- Gangster Al Capone is wounded and garners the nickname "Scarface"
- In March, the Russian Revolution rages and Czar Nicholas II abdicates the throne
- Tornadoes kill 211 people over 4 days in the Midwestern United States
- Seattle is the first U.S. team to win the Stanley Cup in hockey
- The U.S. purchases the Danish West Indies for \$25 million and renames them the Virgin Islands
- Jeanette Rankin of MT begins term as first female member of the U.S. House of Representatives
- Munitions factory explosion at Eddystone, Pennsylvania kills 133 workers
- The Selective Service Act is passed in May, requiring all male citizens and intended citizens, between the ages of 21 and 30, to register their names for possible enrollment in the U.S. military
- The Great Fire of Atlanta displaces approximately 10,000 people with only one fatality
- Russian newspaper *Pravda* calls for the killing of all capitalists, priests, and officers
- October Revolution in Russia; Lenin and Bolsheviks seize power, capture the Winter Palace, overthrow the Provisional Government
- 1st class U.S. mail increases price to 3 cents per ounce
- In December, the United States becomes the 13th country to declare war on Austria during World War I
- An armistice is reached between the new Russian Bolshevik government and the Central Powers
- The 18th Amendment, authorizing prohibition of alcohol, is approved by the U.S. Congress and sent to the states for ratification
- Notable Births in 1917:** Ella Fitzgerald, Louis Zamperini, John Fitzgerald Kennedy, Zsa Zsa Gabor, Raymond Burr, Dean Martin, John Birks "Dizzy" Gillespie, Phyllis Diller, Robert Mitchum, Red Auerbach, Jo Stafford, and Indira Gandhi
- Notable Deaths in 1917:** William "Buffalo Bill" Cody, Admiral George Dewey, Andrew Murray, Ferdinand von Zeppelin, Scott Joplin, Edgar Degas, Mata Hari, Queen Liliuokalani, Emile Durkheim, and Auguste Rodin
